Sometimes it can be crowded but it's easy to make friends. We like the animals and the people. We like the big trees and the flowers and the parks near where we live. We like that we're a community and we help each other.

Not a lot of people know about

do there. We can tell you all about our
history and all the different people in
different communities. We want to
show you what we see and what it's
like to live here so you can see this
place through our eyes.

We children see places differently than adults. We can see things that adults can't see, and we judge them in a different way that we think might be better. It's like when you give us an ordinary cardboard box and we climb inside it and think it's a massive castle – we know how to use our imaginations more. Because we can imagine more stuff than adults, we know more places to go and more ways to have fun. So if you want a more fun and funny and better experience of Knowsley, read this book and we will soothe your minds.

We recommend you read this book in the library because it's quiet and you won't get distracted. Or you can read it at home in bed or under a tree. Read it in the back garden on a sunny day or in a forest or a park because it's so peaceful. Read it on the train or the bus or read it on the beach.

Do not read this book in a massive hole that you can't get out of. Don't try and read it in your house when your little brother is going crazy throwing sand everywhere and your dad is in the kitchen messing with the pots and pans. Do not read it in the city centre at night or on the roof of Anfield whilst a match is on (just don't). Do not read it in the Year 5 class at Holy Family as it's chaos. Don't read it at the water park as it will get wet or in the safari park as it might get eaten by lions. Do not read it in a bin.

When you are finished you could donate this guidebook to a library or read it to your dog if your dog likes listening to your voice. Or you could give this book to someone else.

Give it to someone who is new to school or your family members who live in a different country. Give the guidebook to your step-family from Manchester or Ava's grandad who's an author who does lots of art. Give it to your aunty who's coming to Huyton and doesn't know her way around.

Give a copy to Chappell Roan and to King Charles. Give a copy to Molly who's from Knowsley but is moving to a different country so she can remember what it's like here. Give a copy to the Mayor and to any new people who come to visit or stay. Give it to your friends and family and different people from around the world. Pass it on or sell it or just reread it yourself.

We hope in our guidebook you learn to visit Knowsley and see lots of places here. We hope you learn the way around, the history, fun facts, new knowledge and things you didn't know before. We hope you learn to save the environment and about different people's cultures.

We hope you learn to appreciate Knowsley and the people in it. It's a good place to live and we like it here.

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FACTS & INFORMATION

- Knowsley is made up of 8 places
 Cronton, Halewood, Huyton,
 Kirkby, Knowsley Village, Prescot,
 Stockbridge Village and Whiston.
- There are between 20,000 and 200,000 people in Knowsley. There are 5,000 adults and 600 to 50,000 children.
- There are 1,500 dogs and 5,000 cats in Knowsley. There are 10,000 pigeons and over a billion rats (check behind the chippy). There are either 0 or 250 or 1 million ghosts.
- The most common jobs in Knowsley are teacher, doctor, and shop worker. The average adult makes £316.25 per week.
- On a scale of 1-10 the average happiness of people in Knowsley is 7.6.

- The people of Knowsley like to eat fish and chips, pasta bakes, chicken fried rice, noodles, sandwiches, pizza and chicken nuggets.
- For fun they like to do fundraisers, make TikTok videos, go on walks with friends, ride bikes, dance, sing, go to the beach or go to Spaceworld.
- The people of Knowsley like to complain about traffic, money, bills, litter, chip portions being too small, potholes, the government, people running on the farmer's fields and most of all the weather.
- At night they dream about being a footballer, winning the lottery and better weather.
- Some things all the people in Knowsley have in common are that they work hard and they like football, fish and chips and watching telly. They are all part of a community.

THESE ARE THE FAMOUS SIGHTS OF KNOWSLEY



We really like Knowsley Safari Park as there are lots of animals and rides – you could have lots of fun, also you can make lots of memories. We think it is a very peaceful place that keeps animals safe and lets you see animals you can't see normally. We like it because of the monkeys on the car – they steal your window wipers. It's delightful.

Huyton Cross

Looks like a water fountain. We think it was built in 1896. We think that a little girl died near this area and now everyone who passes will see the girl in the window made of concrete.



For Mums

We made this heart statue for our mums because they help us with all our things and we always have a laugh together and sometimes we can't take it, it is that funny.



For Dads

This is a monument to our dads. We love them for everything they do for us.

Brave Horse

This is a remember statue for a brave horse who was killed in World War II. To help people remember that horse, who was really important to people a long time ago.

Harold Wilson Statue

This is an elegant small statue located in Huyton Village. We think that he is a CEO of Huyton Village. Whenever we go to the village we say, "Hello, my handsome sir."

Elephant in a Boat

This is an elephant sculpture in the town centre. It is from the 1700s. It looks like an elephant in a boat. It is for people to play on and stop judging elephants. It is a sign of peace, and to let elephants be happy. We think it is very nice and precious.




Goldfish

For Sick People

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This is Whiston Hospital. It takes care of people and helps people with their mental and physical injuries. It saves people's lives. Built in 1958 or 1999. We think it is good for sick people.



Nana

This statue is for nanas because they never shout and they are always smiling.

The Big House

We call this one Knowsley Hall or Christmas Hall or The Big House. It is a trillionaire's mansion, full of vintage stuff to show people what it was like in the olden days. You can have weddings here, and it's where you vote for the President. It could have been made in the 19th Century. We think it is very fancy, cool and kind of a good building. Whoever bought it is rich.

Pigeon House

This is Pigeon House or Pigeon Tower. We think it was built in 1939. It is old and rusty and doesn't have a use anymore, but it is close to a shop that is very cheap and has lots of sweets.

Good, Fine, Scary, Boneless

An amazing skull of a jester, to represent jesters. Also called the skeleton head graveyard. Built in 1984 or 2014. It is next to the health centre near the Tesco. Good, fine, scary, boneless. It's a statue for fun. It might be for a circus.



Sisters

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This is a monument in the shape of a cup. It is in the grass by Cronton primary school. We made this statue for our sisters because they are special to us and they help teach us how to cook. They also help us improve playing football. Whenever we get back from school they have a hot chocolate ready for us.



Love

This is a statue in the shape of a paw print. It is for our dogs because they bring love into our lives.

Famous Forest

This is a quarry and a famous forest in Cronton. Built in 1895. It used to be a waterfall and people jumped down it, but people stopped because the water evaporated. People rock climb here and there is a swing. There are rabbits, squirrels and lots of rare birds. We have been there and there's loads of nettles. It is a good place to walk your dog and people do.

Mossy Rock Thing

This is Cronton Cross or Moss Henge. It is a mossy rock thing. We think this is interesting and historical. It could have been built in the Medieval times. It was used for resting when people carried coffins to the church. It is a place to reflect, maybe have a little cry and a moment to look back at some memories.



Brothers

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This is a statue we made for our brothers because they are really special people and they are always there for us and protecting us.

The Super Peaceful Pond

There is a secret pond by my house and it is super peaceful. It is surrounded by thick bushes and nettles and then you have to go down a ditch to see the super peaceful pond. I would not have found out about it, were it not for my 13-year-old neighbour. Unfortunately it is filled with leaves and rubbish.

The Toppy

I always have known about The Toppy. It is like a calm place. Most people don't know about it because it is well hidden. A little group of people go there when it snows. It is sketchy but fun.

The Locked Tunnel

The Overgrown Forest



The Little Den

In the park next to my home there is a little den which I found when I went to the park. I like it because it is very mysterious. No one ever except me has found it because no one goes to the part of the park it is in.

The Muddy Path

I like to go to Stadt Moers and go around the lake. No one normally is there in the winter. There is a secret way to go to the other side of the lake. You have to go through a gap through the trees and follow the path which is made of mud.

The Charity Shop

A charity shop has opened recently in Huyton Village. Not many people go there. One time my dad bought a 1966 England badge for £20 and it was worth £30k. People in Huyton underestimate charity shops.

THE ORDINARY STREETS OF KNOWSLEY

All across Knowsley – in Cronton,
Prescot and Halewood, in Huyton and
Whiston and Kirkby, in Knowsley
Village and Stockbridge Village – you
will find ordinary streets like the
streets near our schools where we live.

On our streets you can find shops and cafés and huge fields and lovely green hills that make our day. There is a chippy across the road and a big stadium where people play football. We love the tall trees and how all the leaves fall down in autumn and also the Tesco. At Halloween and Christmas people decorate their houses and it's very beautiful and on bonfire night we all go to the field and we do a big fire.

We like it when our friends live nearby and there are lots of kids to play with and lots of grass to play on. We play kerby with our mates or we go to the duck pond and walk around. It is peaceful and everyone is nice and friendly. We can ride our bikes and do cartwheels on the grass. Sometimes it is so quiet. There is no noise at all.

On our streets the people are nice and welcoming and if you need help they will help you. There is John who lives opposite and is very sweet. Bob makes lots of things from wood and he looks after old furniture and cars. There is Sean Hessey who was a footballer and our neighbour who is a scout for Everton. There is our neighbour who sings in the shower and our other neighbour who gave us a football which was a bit random. Our friend's neighbour catches mice and sings strange songs and our other neighbour doesn't talk but his brother doesn't stop talking. The people in number 8 are interesting people. There is Shelley who has a lot of pets and Sian who knows a lot more than we do. There is Albert who sadly passed away. There's a pigeon who lives on our street. There are bulls, sheep, horses and foxes. There are cats and dogs.

A tortoise, a guinea pig, a rabbit, squirrels and a hedgehog that comes into our front garden every night.

When we play out our neighbours look after us. It's a very nice place to live in.

Some of our streets are very quiet and hardly ever become overwhelming, but on some of them we are not allowed to play out because of the cars. Sometimes there are lots of motorbikes and everyone parks on the path. We wish there were painted football lines and a new and bigger pavement. We wish there were less cars and a cleaner field. We want new telephone poles with less fungus growing on them and a small greenhouse for everyone to come and grow flowers. We want the swans to move.



There is a scary bungalow at the end of the street and a loud dog and when the bin men come it makes all the streets stink. Sometimes there's screaming and sometimes people set fires in the wood. People throw litter boxes over the fence and all the leaves fall off the trees and mess the up the front of the houses. There are flowers on the field and when we play football we trample them.

We don't like the hotel that has parties when we go to bed. We don't like the fireworks that go off at night and we don't like the amount of dog/cat business. We don't like the fact that things keep breaking like windows and elevators. We don't like the holes in the road and when the kids act hard. We wish there were more people to play with. Maybe we could have a waterpark on the hill opposite us. Maybe there could be a bicycle and scooter lane. Maybe we could get more leaves in the autumn. Maybe everything could be a tiny bit bigger.

But we remember the firework show where there were barbecues and the huge party for the Queen's Jubilee. We remember when a water fight broke out randomly and when we built an ant village and when two ice cream trucks came at the same time.

At Christmas people sing Christmas carols and a fake Santa Claus comes round in a car and everyone takes pictures. We remember when our friend caught a butterfly and when someone was walking their cat. We remember when someone crashed into the church and when the nextdoor neighbour's cat killed a pigeon in the garden. We remember the flood and when our neighbours had a fight about whose bike was better. We remember when we left the door open and a pigeon came into the house. We remember when we saw the Northern Lights. We remember when Thomas dropped his phone.

One day our neighbours woke up and found their garage door wide open and it wasn't even windy. We remember someone throwing rocks at car windows and when someone's brother got hit by a car. We remember when two wheelie bins got stolen and when a German Shepherd chased everyone round the field. The dramas we walk out to every night.

If you look closely, on our streets you will see lovely-shaped clouds that look like things and black bins and solar panels. Power lines and lampposts and coins dropped by people. Electric. Cameras. Pipes and slugs and leaves.

You can't see what's behind all of the trees. There might be squirrels in the trees. There might be bugs under the bins. There might be a cat under the car. There might be people saying "I love you," behind the fence.

Under the streets there are spiders and worms. There are dinosaur bones and coffins. You can find Viking helmets and Roman arrows and the tracks of Victorian mine trains. Coal. Crystals. Secret passageways. Unexploded bombs. Monsters and myth.

These are the streets we live on. They are full of caring and loyal people. We love the sunsets. We love the parks and the sound of young kids playing and the birds.

The New Park Of Knowsley

The best thing about Knowsley is the new park we built on the hill. It's a place for everyone to play together with fun equipment. We built it to get away from the cars on the road and because the kids on our streets are always looking for fun.

In the park there are slides for sliding and monkey bars for swinging. There are wiggle lines and a sandpit and a



rock-climbing wall and a bench where people can sit and rest if they have a sore back. There's a ball pit and soft play. There's a big kid area and there is a bouncy castle for anyone to enjoy and a rollercoaster. There is hopscotch and a dance floor and the biggest trampoline ever. There's a magic slide and a slide with a secret room inside the slide, and a giant washing machine especially for shoes.

There are toy cars and a motorbike racing track and a petting zoo and a dog lake. A pet shop with a puppy section and kitten section. There's a bughouse and horse riding stable so we can practice horse riding whenever we want. There's a bunny rabbit field and a forest and animal reserve to encourage more wildlife into the area. At Christmas there's a Christmas tree for everyone to enjoy.

There's a minifridge for drinks and a hot dog machine and other food vending machines for late night food when the shops are closed. There's a free ice cream van and a chocolate and marshmallow stand and a lemonade stand and there's also a coffee machine for parents. A cleaner robot that tells jokes goes around the park every day and makes everybody happy

Next to the park there are football pitches with the grass cut nicely and a basketball pitch, a baseball pitch and a running track. There's a netball court and a Chick-fil-A. There's a waterpark with a swimming pool and an ultimate water slide and a diving board, and a free fair for adults and kids where anyone can come and have fun every day after school and on the weekends. There's an ultra-mega treehouse which we made for £0.00 from fallen down trees and old rope, with a telescope and a zipline and another tree where you can write your good memories on a piece of paper and hang them on the tree. We made this because we won't be able to relive all the good memories and we want to remember each one.

Our schools are nice and beautiful and have a big heart.

Our teachers are kind and caring. We get to go on school trips, have parties and sometimes watch drama plays in the hall. And whilst we do love being at school, one of the best things about school is home time.

The hardest thing about our school is the learning and the writing. We learn so much that our hands hurt. Plus, handwriting is hard. Another hard thing about school is bullying. It is hard at the start when you are new and you have to make friends. But the main hard thing is maths, 100%. And the work gets harder the older you get!

Our favourite places in the whole school are: the library because we love reading; the quiet club because it is relaxing; the big tree because you can climb on it, and that bit near the playground door because when the teachers are not looking you can do gymnastics.


 Moers Park as it is a great safe open

The Secret Walk to Stadt Moers

Welcome to a secret walk to Stadt
Moers. To start, you will go out of

Another Walk Around Cronton

On this walk people should notice animals and wildlife. The most difficult thing will be to walk past the haunted house. You might hear or see the dog that sticks its head under the gate and barks. Keep going and you will find Parklands Sports Club which has also got a cafe in the building. Then you will come across Upton Rocks Park where you can have a play. Coming near the end you will see the cenotaph where you can have a look at the stocks. Finally, you cross the road to get to Crossroads Chippy to end the day and have some tea. The end.

An Active Walk

Start at Sandstone Drive. Turn left onto Delph Lane. Take a right and enter Henley Park. Go to the play area to climb and slide. Then have a game of tag and do a workout on the gym equipment. Exit the park onto Warrington Road and turn left. Stop at the shop for a cherry cola to recover. Remember to do all this with ice cubes in your shoes.

Wherever we are, remember us, and remember what we showed you. This is a memento from a moment in time. This is what it was like to live in Knowsley in 2025.


